Reds Drop Whites, 14-0, In Frosh Intersquad Tilt

I.U.'s freshman football team, playing as two units, red and white, gave Homecoming fans a preview of the side-saddle-T at a scrimmage on Memorial Field Friday. The red squad, using a very effective passing attack, scored a 14-0 victory over their comrades in white.

The line play, blocking and tackling, of both squads was crisp with the white line showing a slight edge overall. The white defense, however, could not cope with the aerial attack of red quarterbacks, Ted Ringsdorf of Luzerne (Pa.), and Dick Van Wieren of Cadillac (Mich.).

Ringsdorf, a 5'11", 175 lb. signal caller, passed to end Randy Williams, 6'3" Gary Roosevelt product, for 25 yards and a touch-down. Van Wieren, 6'1", 190 lb. tosser, set up the second touch-down on strikes to end Ray Grasch of Louisville (Ky.) and tailback Tom Stapleton of Middlesboro (Ky.).

Red's Luongo Scores Safety.

Red fullback Allan Reeves of Long Branch (N.J.) toted the ball into the end zone from about two yards out for the final marker. The red team gained two points on a safety as Fred Luongo broke

ly afterwards. Van Wieren grabbed a partially blocked toss for two of the interceptions.

Wingback Ken Smith played a terrific defensive game for the whites, while Dick Cooper, end

from Mishawaka, starred offensively, making several fine catches while heavily covered by red defenders. George McPherson of Hamilton (O.) mainstayed the flock of fine white linemen.

through to nail tailback Toby Pranter on an end sweep. Luongo is from Linden (N.J.) and Prather hails from East Detroit (Mich.).

The finesse of quarterbacks Ringsdorf and Van Wieren surprised many observers and led to the red victory. Ringsdorf especially looked impressive as he handled himself with the poise of a veteran. His passes hit receivers with regularity even though the white line pressed him all afternoon. Van Wieren, also quite composed under pressure, showed the quick thinking of a good field general.

White Passes Intercepted.

The white team had several of their aerial attempts picked off by red defenders, stalling all drives they started. Harvey Yearling, Middlesboro (Ky.) tailback, snared one white pass and short-
