But now, Doyle Durkee, the guy who has been the mainstay on this year's club, is also No. 1. Durkee, the senior sharpshooter, is now the top scorer in

Durkee entered the Meridian game Friday night tied with Houghton Lake's Erig Drogt. Each had 240 points.

But Durkee got 29 points in a 70-45 victory over Meridian, while Drogt hit for 24 in a 64-61 Houghton Lake victory over Coleman.

In the other two contests, Evart bombed Harrison, 89-70, and Roscommon took Farwell, 66-45.

That leaves Beaverton with a 12-1 record in a race where the runnerup spot is the only question.

Roscommon is 8-5, Harrison, Houghton Lake and Coleman are 7-6. But Roscommon plays at Beaverton next week and Houghton Lake and Coleman play each other.

Durkee got a dozen points in support from Ken Neighbors for Beaverton now

Dave Musser and Neil Pritchard combined for 47 points for Evart with Musser getting 25. Jim Yost had 20, Robin Huber 14 and Mark Smith 11 for Harrison.

Paul Brugger scored 17, Dean Johnson 14 and Dud Strauch 10 for Coleman which managed only seven points in the fourth quarter as the Bobcats clinched the victory.

Hitting on six of six shots and throwing in a free throw to boot, Durkee scored 13 of Beaverton's 22 first-quarter points.

The 6-foot-1 senior guard made shooting 20-footers look easy as he dropped in three long, high-arching jumpers from that range in the first eight minutes of the game. Finishing with 29 points for the night — despite not scoring at all in the second quarter due to foul trouble — Durkee also turned a pretty three-point play in the first pretty three-point play in the first stanza to help his team jump out in

front.

"He's definitely an all-conference guard," said Meridian coach Al Harvey afterwards. "He's probably the best in the league.

But Durkee was far from a lone star for Beaverton as several other players contributed to the win.

Beaver coach Roy Johnston was especially pleased with senior forward Ken Neighbors, who pulled down 12 rebounds for the night, and center Jeff Roehrs, who added 10 caroms. "They really played well," he said.

In addition, Johnston couldn't help but be pleased with the overall team ef-fort. "We were hitting the open man real well and I thought we played some real good defense," he said. "Our defense really shut them down in the first
