







Experience, detense expected to lead Lady Beavers in search of J-P hoop title

A team consisting of 8 experienced varsity players and several untested underclassmen, combined with a lot of hustle and determination could make this another exciting season for the Beaverton varsity girls basketball squad.

Beaverton faces its first test Wednesday, Sept. 3, when the Beavers travel to Pinconning. The Lady Beavers will then host county-rival Gladwin the following night.

The Beaverettes lost 3 players to graduation, including 3-time all-conference selection Jackie Ashcroft, the key player last year who also received honorable mention all-state honors. The other 2 lost were Jen Huskins and exchange student Minako Nakata.

Beaver on compiled a 17-7 overall record last year when they finished 13-3 in the Jack Pine Conference, good enough for 2nd place behind Hor ghton Lake. The Lady Beavers also won their 2nd straight district title before getting knocked out by Frankenmuth in the regional finals.

"We've go: some good quickness and a lot of experience coming back, said Coach Doyle Durkee. "We need to play confident and work hard to beat people at their gym: We have to do well in the away games."

Beaverton was undefeated at home last year and suffered all 7 of its losses on the road. Durkee says this year's team has to remain focused when they are not at home. Leading the 1991 team will be 8 returning veterans: Katie Parker, Tina and Dena Argyle, Karrie Snyder, Sally Grant, Jennifer Oldani, Missy Gunningham and Beth Engler.

Parker, a 5/8" senior co-captain, is a versatile player coming off a great season in 1990. She was an all-conference 2nd team member and helped spark the offense.

"Katie is a strong rebounder and a tough inside player," Durkee said. "She has good hands and will play the point on our press. Katie has tremendous stamins."

The coach is expecting to have Parker contribute a little more in the scoring department and 1 er shot has improved from last year, he added.

"She is such a versatile player that we'll use her almost anywhere in any type of situation." Durkee added. "Katie is a great person to have on this team."

Classmate Tina Argyle has been the point guard on the varsity the past 3 years and will move to the shooting guard position. The 4-year varsity starter will be counted on by her teammates for her leadership, the coach said. This is Tina's 2nd year as co-captain.

"Tina is shooting more and will be scoring quite a few more points for us this season," Durkee noted. "She did a good job in that respect this summer. She has worked real hard on her shot. Tina is a real team leader out there."

Twin sister, Dena Argyle, is also in her 4th year of varsity basketball. The 5"6" for yard is a "pure shooter" and one of the best scorers in the conference, according to her coach.

"Dena is a 3-year varsity starter who can fill it up from 3-point land," Durkee said. "We'd like to get Dena 20 to 25 shots a game. She is a silky smooth player who really glides up and down the floor with very little effort."

Another key to the Beavers' success on the hard court this year may be the play of senior Karrie Snyder, who will take over as point guard. This is her 3rd year on the varsity squad and her

1st season as a starter.

"Karrie gives you a lot of heart and soul," Durkee said. "She is a tremendous asset to the team. She has surprising quickness and is a good floor leader and she can put the ball in if you don't watch out. At 5'3" she is one of the best post-up players her size and she can do a job on girls much taller.

Classmate Sally Grant is a 5'9" post player in her 2nd year at the varsity ranks. She played quite a bit near the end of last season and the coach is looking for more positive things to happen this

scason.

She will give us a lot more versatility inside. Sally is tremendously strong," Durkee said. "She has a great attitude and has worked hard this summer. She is a nice post-up player and did real well for us at team camp.

5'7" junior Jennifer Oldani will play the post position and is in her 3rd year of varsity basketball. The coach noted Jennifer is starting to develop the skills of her

inside game.

"She still needs to work on them, but Jen works harder than anyone on the team," Durkee said. "She is going to really help

Senior Missy Gunningham is a 5'5" shooting guard and a "pure shooter" who could make the Beaver offense explode, the coach

pointed out.

"Missy is shooting the ball extremely well right now and shows a lot of confidence out there, Durkee said. "She scored well at team camp and I look for her to do the job for us this season. She has a lot of versatility and can play any 3 positions well. Missy is a great kid."

Classmate Beth Engier will play the post position. The coach noted Beth has "worked real hard the last 2 years" to improve her basketball skills and it may pay off big dividends this season.

"Beth had some good minutes at team camp and she could help us," Durkee said. "Her rebounding, scoring and intimidation on defense are a real plus for us."

Sophomore Jennifer Johnson is a versatile player "who is loaded with natural talent," the coach said. "She handles and shoots the ball extremely well and can get down and dirty and play defense with the best of them. She can play any of the 5 positions and do them exceptionally well."

Durkee added Jennifer is picking up the patterns of the game well and needs to mature a little physically. But, he expects her to be one of the mainstays in the Beaverton basketball program for

the next 3 seasons.

Another newcomer to the varsity is 5'6" junior Lynn Wagner, who will play at post. She is a strong rebounder and tough defensive player.

"Lynn needs to develop her offensive skills and get some time on the floor," Durkee said. "She is a real hard nosed player,"

Junior Heather Wesley is a 5'5" point and shooting guard and "a very gifted athlete," according to her coach. She shows a lot of stamina on the floor, he added.

"Heather is a monster on defense and really hawks the ball," Durkee said. "She needs to work on her offense and realize what kinds of things we want her to

Classmate Haley Brubaker will play the forward/post position. The coach said the 5'3" junior is another good athlete with some decent basketball skills.

"She is a good defensive player with great quickness," he said. She rebounds real well and we'll use her in certain spots.

Junior April Coopersmith is a 5'2" point guard who didn't see a lot of time on the loor last season with the junior varsity squad.

"April has a good head for the game and we need to work with her and get her some minutes," the coach said "She can score and will help us put the ball in the hole. She is a great kid with a good attitude and works extremely hard.

Classmate Colleen Ruhle also didn't see much action as a JV player, but played a lot this summer to prepare for this year.

"Colleen is working hard, playing good defense and rebounding," Durkee said. "She needs to try to be less timid and battle for position underneath."

The team's strengths are in experience, quickness, shooting ability and defensive hustle. Their weaknesses are their lack of size, which makes rebounding and the inside game both critical areas for the Lady Beavers to do well on. Also, the bench lacks a lot of varsity experience.

Durkee feels 5 teams will battle it out for the conference title this year: Houghton Lake, Rosconrmon, Beaverton, Farwell and Harrison. And, he is looking forward to capturing his first league

championship.

The conference is going to be exceptionally tough this year and the winner may take the title with 3 losses," he said. "We had 3 conference teams win district championships last year and that casily could happen again, if we get split up."
"We need to play with confi-

dence to be successful this year,"

Durkee added.

"If we can take some important wins on the road, that will really boost our confidence."

Durkee is joined by Dick Merkle, who is coaching the 14 members on the junior varsity squad. Randy Govitz is the 8th grade coach and Pat Dillon is instructing the 7th graders.

The Lady Beavers open their season at Pinconning Wednesday. The rest of the basketball schedule for the varsity and JV are home with Gladwin Sept. 4 and Farwell Sept. 12; at Roscommon Sept. 17 and Coleman Sept. 24; home with Meridian Sept. 26. Houghton Lake Oct. 1 and Clare Oct. 3; at Harrison Oct. 8 and Gladwin Oct. 10; home with Roscommon Oct. 15 and Pinconning Oct. 17; at Farwell Oct. 22; home with Manistee Oct. 25; at Meridian Oct. 29; home with Coleman Nov. 5; at Clare Nov. 7 and Houghton Lake Nov. 12; and at Harrison Nov. 14.

Junior varsity games start at 6 p.m., except those in Gladwin and Pinconning at 6:15. The varsity game follows.

Pressure defense combined with quickness and fast breaks prevailed last Wednesday as Beaverton's varsity girls basketball squad rolled to an easy 68-43 win over county rival Gladwin at the Beaver gym.

The Lady Beavers opened their season last Tuesday with a 69-68 overtime victory over host Pin-

conning.

Against the G's, Beaverton sprinted out to an early 21-2 lead at the end of the 1st period. Beaverton's half court press and hounding defense continued to give Gladwin trouble in the 2nd quarter as the Lady Beavers opened up a 39-16 margin at intermission.

The Beaverettes picked up where they left off in the 3rd quarter and outscored Gladwin 16-6 to take a 55-22 lead into the final 8 minutes. The Lady G's finally got on track offensively in the 4th quarter as they outscored Beaverton 21-13, but it wasn't nearly

Senior Tina Argyle powered the Beaverton attack with 21 points, while classmate Sally Grant added 14 and Katie Parker, 10.

"Defensively, we missed some assignments and we missed a lot of easy shots," Durkee said. "We were fortunate to pull it out and it was an exciting way to start the season. It was also a great confidence builder for the kids."

The Beaverettes, 2-0, will try to stay on the winning track when they host Farwell Thursday in the Jack Pine Conference opener for both teams. Beaverton travels to Roscommon Tuesday in league

Leading Gladwin was a junior Shawn Claypool with 19 points.

Both teams hit 43% of their field goal attempts: The Beaverettes were 30 of 69 and Gladwin was 16 of 37. Beaverton converted 8 of 16 free throws (50%). compared to the G's 13 of 21 (62%).

The Lady Beavers dominated the boards 40-14 with Parker and Grant each pulling down 7. Jill Heath collected 4 rebounds to

pace Gladwin.

"I was very pleased with our performance, especially on defense and I felt the first team did a great job," said Coach Doyle Durkee. "Tina Argyle had a super game and Sally Grant really worked hard at both ends of the floor. We had good position, shot the ball well and rebounded."

Durkee commended senior guard Karrie Snyder for her play

on defense.

"Karrie did a great job and really worked at slapping the ball away," the coach noted.

Parker grabbed an offensive rebound and put in the winning basket with 30 seconds left in overtime to lift her team to a victory over Pinconning last Tuesday.

Beaverton edged out to a 14-13 1st quarter lead, but the Spartans rallied to tie the score at 27-27 at halftime. The Beaver offense got into gear and netted 21 points in the 3rd stanza to take a 48-45 lead into the 4th quarter.

The Beaverettes held an 11point advantage midway through the period but Pinconning rallied and tied the score to send it into overtime. Parker's shot gave Beaverton the lead and Tina Argyle grabbed a rebound after the Spartans missed a shot to secure the non-league win.

Sophomore Jennifer Johnston tallied 14 points to pace Beaverton's offense, while Parker added 12 and Dena Argyle, 11. Christie Gruszynski scored 19 points to lead Pinconning, while Jill Le-Bourdais had 17 and Sarah

Swallow, 15.

Beaverton hit 27 of 76 shots from the floor (36%), compared to the Spartans' 26 of 54 (48%). The Lady Beavers made 13 of 22 free throw attempts, while Pinconning was 13 of 21 (62%).

The Spartans held a 41-33 advantage on the boards as Swallow grabbed 10 rebounds and Gruszynski, 9. Grant and Parker each collected 9 rebounds for the Beavers.

Lady Beavers fall to Farwell in overtime, 48-44, Thursday

Farwell scored 8 points in overtime to earn a 48-44 victory over Beaverton Thursday in the Jack Pine Conference opener at the Eagles' gym.

The game was originally scheduled at Beaverton, but a break in a sewer line at the school canceled classes Thursday and forced the game to be moved to Farwell.

Beaverton trailed 10-7 in the 1st period and 20-17 at halftime. Farwell extended the margin to 34-27 as Lynn Branstrom scored 11 of her game high 15 points in the 3rd stanza.

The Lady Beavers railied with 13 points in the final 8 minutes and they held the ball with 23 seconds left in regulation. After a couple of attempts to get the ball inside, sophomore Jennifer Johnston attempted a 15-foot jumper that rattled the rim and missed, sending the game into overtime.

Dena Argyle hit an 8-foot shot on the Beaverettes' first possession, but Farwell scored on its first 4 possessions to take the league win.

Both teams played aggressive pressure defense throughout the contest.

Johnston finished with 13 points and Tina Argyle added 12

to lead Beaverton. Angle Willett netted 12 points and Heather Richardson had 11 for the Eagles.

Willett pulled down 12 rebounds as Farwell controlled the boards, 46-37. Katte Parker collected 14 for the Beavers.


Beaverton hit just 19 of 76 attempts from the floor (25%), while the Eagles were 20 of 66 (30%). The Beaverettes made 6 of 9 charity tosses (67%), compared to Farwell's 5 of 11 (45%).

"We shot horrendous and missed a ton of easy shots," said Coach Doyle Durkee. "It was a hard fought, defensive struggle, I was disappointed in our rebounds. We didn't get a lot of offensive boards and that hurt us down the stretch."

Beavers drained by road setback

FARWELL — Playing the Jack Pine Conference opener Thursday night was a real drain on the Beaverton girls' basketball team.

Farwell, of course, had a lot to do with the emptiness after handing the visiting Beavers a 48-44 setback in overtime.

Earlier in the day, the Beavers lost their home court advantage when sewage backed up in a drain pipe from the school's septic system. The foul situation led to the cancellation of classes and the basketball game was moved to Farwell.

Just a day earlier, several Beaverton players paid their last respects to 1990 graduate former teammate Jennifer Loar, a 1990 graduate who died unexpectedly Sunday in Detroit.

"With the adversity we've been through, it's a tribute that we're even standing here," said Beaverton coach Doyle Durkee. "But that's neither here nor there; tonight Farwell played a good game and beat us."

Beaverton, now 1-1, rallied from a 34-27 deficit after three quarters to force the extra three minute session.

The Beavers, after missing a long shot at the fourth quarter buzzer, didn't have much of chance in overtime as the host Eagles made every shot count.

Beaverton got the tip in overtime and Dena Argyle scored for the Beavers, but Farwell hit its

next four shots.

Senior Angie Willet, who had 14 points and 14 rebounds, tied the contest with an easy layup, and Andria Ludlum swished a short jumper.

Ludlum, who didn't score in the first half but finished with 15 points, struck again with a running left-hander on a baseline drive.

Beaverton sophomore reserve Jennifer Johnston, who tied the game in the fourth quarter with a long shot that appeared to be outside the arc, made another with less than a minute remaining in overtime.

But neither official noticed again that Johnston was at least a foot from the arc and the basket counted only two points. Willet closed the game scoring

"I wished it would have been a little easier than that," said Farwell coach Lou Cummings. "But we'll take it.

"I hope we don't have to work that hard for all of them but if we have to, I think we've got a good enough team that can play with anybody."

Farwell, now 3-0, outrebounded Beaverton 54-43 and outshot it 30 (20-67) to 25 percent (19-

"Neither team shot that well but this is the first time we've faced man-to-man defense," said Cummings.

The Eagles trailed in parts of the first two quarters but still enjoyed a 20-17 advantage at the break.

Junior Heather Richardson, who nailed a couple three-pointers in the first half, gave the Eagles their biggest lead (34-27) with an arching trey at the third quarter buzzer.

"We took some bad shots all game. Heather took some she shouldn't have but that last three was a big basket," said Gummings. "It came down wet,

she shot it so high." Beaverton rallied around

Johnston in the fourth quarter. The 5-5 guard swished in a long jumper from the key to cut the deficit to 36-31 and Sally Grant, who had four points and 11 rebounds, added an inside bucket to cut the deficit further with just under six minutes showing.

Tina Argyle, who counted an even dozen points for Beaverton, narrowed the disadvantage to

36-35 with a basket (3:05).

Ludlum countered for Farwell before Johnston scored on a three-point play inside to tie the game (1:26). Willet got a backdoor layup to put Farwell ahead but Johnston answered with another long bomb (0:58) to force

Beaverton got the ball back with 23 seconds to go after forcing a jump ball. But after a timeout, Durkee's last-shot strategy was foiled when Grant wasn't allowed to re-enter the game.

The 5-9 senior, who was sitting with four personal fouls, didn't

report soon enough.

"We wanted to work it inside to our big girl (5-9) but we didn't get her in the game in time," said Durkee, "so everything we set up during the timeout wasn't any good."

Johnston finished with a teambest 13 points. Dena Argyle added 9. Katie Parker, who had just two points, grabbed 10 rebounds.

"Johnston did a nice job," said Durkee of his fourth-quarter sparkplug. "We took some good shots, took it inside and played a little tougher defense there."

Beaverton, which beat Pinconning in its opener Sept. 3, will lose the home court advantage with Farwell for the season. The rematch Oct. 22 will also be at Farwell.

"We had to play and take a chance on winning," said Durkee, whose Beavers play at Roscommon Tuesday.

"Maybe it wasn't such a good move. But we're still in good shape. There's five good teams in the league and one loss isn't going to win it."



The Beaverettes pounded Meridian, 66-32 Thursday at home. Earlier in the week, Beaverton fought back from a 1st half deficit to defeat Coleman, 55-46.

Beaverton's quickness, especially off the rebound and into the fast break, led to a 39-12 halftime lead. They extended it to 54-21 going into the final period and easily cruised the rest of the way.

Leading the Beaver offense was Sally Grant with 16 points, while Jennifer Johnston added 14 and Dena Argyle, 10. Jenni Kortjohn and Aubrey VanNortwick each scored 8 points to pace the Mustangs.

Argyle and Beth Engler each pulled down 5 rebo inds to help give the Beaverettes a 36-18 advantage on the boards. Esther Boman led Meridian with 6.

Beaverton hit 24 of 6 field goal attempts (40%) and 16 of 24 foul

shots (67%). The Mustangs made 9 of 26 from the floor (35%) and 14 of 30 from the charity stripe (47%).

"We needed this win. It was a good confidence builder for us and hopefully, it will get us back on the right track," said Coach Doyle Durkee. "We got into their passing lanes heavy and we shut off their offense. All of our kids played hard and we had some good performances off the bench."

The Beaverettes made 25 of 65 shots from the field (38%), while Coleman was 14 of 39 (36%). Beaverton converted 5 of 12 free throws (42%), compared to the Comets' 17 of 33 (52%).


Katie Parker pulled down 12 rebounds despite Coleman's 34-32 advantage in that department. Crowl led the Comets with 15.

He commended Johnston for her steady play in running the offense and added Tina Argyle has given some real consistent effort over the past few games.

The Beaverton varsity basketball team utilized their hot scoring hands in the 1st half to deal a 68-48 victory over Houghton Lake last Tuesday in the Beaver

Later in the week, the host Beavers won their 4th straight Jack Pine Conference game by taking a 57-37 decision over Clare.

The pair of wins set the stage for an important league home game with 1st place Roscommon Tuesday night.





"Tina played excellent defense and Katie Parker played a tough, overall game," the coach noted. "It was a tough loss to take."



ESSEXVILLE - Monday's regional semifinal girls' basketball game between Beaverton and Perry will not be mistaken for a work of art.

But the finish will go down as a masterpiece.

In a game which threatened to be highlighted by missed free throws (29), turnovers (45), fouls (50) and missed field goals (69), Sally Grant came through with a turnaround jumper with three seconds left to give Beaverton a 52-51 win over the Ramblers here at Garber High School.

The win sends the Beavers into the Class B regional finals for the

third consecutive year. Beaverton screamed repeatedly for a time takes on Bay City John Glenn Wednesday at 7 p.m. for the right to advance to the state quarterfinals.

"We missed a lot of shots, and we early — very early — as starting ' missed a lot of free throws.


"Then, at the end, we let their girl (Snyder) get that rebound off the missed free throw with a minute left. If we get that rebound, we're in good shape."





Up until that point, the Bobcats had clawed their way to an 8-3 lead. Beaverton then rallied to tie the score at 12 by the end of




Beaverton opened the second quarter with an 11-2 run to move ahead 23-14. The game was never close from that point on as the Beavers entered the break ahead 33-21.





"This team is 32-12 over the last two years," said Sturm. "I'm very proud of what they accomplished."

Beaverton would have been hard to beat on any night with a performance similar to the one it gave

The Beavers used a 21-point second quarter to build a 33-21 halftime lead, then outscored Glenn in the third period 19-12. They were a combined 17 of 31 from the floor in the second and third quarters.

"I take my hat off to Beaverton," Sturm said. "They did a great job doing the things they had to do ... a better job than we did at doing what we

had to do.

"I know Doyle felt his team finally broke out of it was unfortunate they had to do it against us."

Glenn shot out to an early 8-3 lead but was treading on thin ice as starting center Stephanie Degg picked up three fouls in the game's first four minutes.

The Bobcats then lost forward Rachel Neal later in the quarter

with an ankle injury.

"Rachel moves over to center when Stephanie is out of there, so that put us in a bind," said Sturm. "People don't realize how important Stephanie is to our defense."

Beaverton's Katie Parker exploited Glenn's vulnerability in the middle. A senior, Parker finished with a game-high 23 points, made nine of her 14 floor shots, and had eight rebounds.

Dena Argyle provided the outside punch for the Beavers with 18 points, 16 of those coming in the first half as she hit eight of her first 12 shots. Reserve guard Jen Johnston chipped in with 1 points.

Defensively, Beaverton did good job of keeping Glenn's bij gun, Ashley Reagh, from catching fire. Reagh, a senior, scored nine points, none of which came easy.

The Beavers outscored Glenn 11-2 to start the second quarter. Argyle scored on a putback for a 20-14 lead, then Parker followed with a three-point play.

Glenn came back to close within 23-19, but Beaverton went

on a 8-0 run.

Parker scored six points and Karrie Snyder four during a 10-0 run that increased Beaverton's lead to 22 points in the third quarter.

Beaverton finished the night 25 of 57 from the floor (44 percent) but most importantly ended two years of regional tournament frustration.

"We made it to the finals the last two years and lost," said Durkee. "We lost last year by a point to Frankenmuth. It feels great to get this one."





Kingsford's press flattens

CORUNNA — Kingsford's defense forced the Beaverton girls' basketball team to press and then unravel in a 66-44 Class B quarterfinal loss here

Wednesday night.

The timeout followed a 6-2 run by Kingsford that included a basket and a three-point play inside by Kris Wozniak.

Kingsford took its biggest lead of the half when Kerry Nora extended the run with a basket.

Things started looking bleaker when Tina Argyle picked up her third

personal foul after a turnover seconds later. However, Wozniak evened the score by collecting her third personal a half minute later trying to stop Katie Parker on a drive to the hoop.


Wozniak, Kingsford's big girl at 5-9, had seven points at the time but finished with a game-high 19 and eight rebounds.





Beavers bow from tourney

CORUNNA — Beating Kingsford was a pressing matter for Beaverton in Class B girls' basketball quarterfinal play here Wednesday night.

The press won.

The Beavers could not overcome Kingsford's full-court press throughout most of the night and the result was a season-ending, 66-44 defeat. The Beavers stayed with Kingsford early and led the game 14-10 when Katie Parker hit an 8-foot jumper with 2:50 left in the first quarter. But the Flivvers closed out the quarter with a 7-0 run to take a 17-14 lead.

The lead was extended to nine points early in the second quarter when Kingsford center Kris Wozniak went to the bench with her third foul less than three minutes into the period. Beaverton immediately cut the deficit to three, 25-22, but the Upper Peninsula team regrouped to lead by eight at halftime.

Durkee commended his seniors, particularly Parker for their never-say-die attitudes in the final game. He was also pleased with the way his team hit the boards for timely rebounds.




